Assignment Two - Due Date: First day of school

Required Reading: *Hatchet* by Gary Paulsen

We will discuss the required reading book in class starting the first day of school. This is our first unit of study, and you will have projects and assignments based on your reading. I expect you to have your book fully read when you come to class in order to be able to participate.

**When you read, you should pay attention to main characters, various settings, plots, and themes presented in the book. After we discuss the book in class, you can also expect to be tested on that material.*

In addition to the books you choose from the reading list, please continue reading all summer. At this age, reading levels and interests widely vary. Therefore, I always encourage parents to look at these selections with your child when they are choosing. Focus on the Family has a wonderful website with hundreds of book reviews from a Christian perspective! I encourage you to visit www.thrivingfamily.com (click on Media, then click on Book Reviews) to preview books before your child reads them. In some cases, you may want to read the book with your child and discuss difficult topics, and don't dismiss reading aloud to each other. They are NOT too old! No matter what they choose to read for pleasure, it is important to simply get them reading. A short, easy read can spark an interest and encourage reluctant readers to keep reading. You can never read too many books! Thank you for your support. I hope you enjoy your summer reading. See you in the fall!
